Will become 4 to the nearest whole number or 3.7 to the nearest tenth (I decimal place)




"This graph could show my walk to the park, and the fact that I spent 5 minutes calling for a friend on the way."

This is a picture close up of the tiger in a painting by Henri Rousseau. You will be creating a picture inspired by his in your topic activity and the full picture is on your topic activity page. First imagine you are in the picture. How do you think the tiger feels? What do you think he is doing? Recording



Henri Rousseau used his imagination and things around him to make his paintings. He used plants from the botanical gardens and had not seen a tiger in its natural habitat. Zoos in the 1890s did not try to keep animals happy or comfortable, just display the animals so he did not know what a jungle scene looked like.



Wednesday:

Make a water cycle

Use a zipper bag or seal a strong freezer bag with clear tape to seal it. Put a small amount of water in the bottom of the freezer

Bag. Tape the bag to the window (preferably in direct sunlight) and wait. When the water starts to evapouate, condensation will form at the top of the bag. Label the condensation. When there is too much condensation it will start to trickle down the bag in droplets; this is like rain. Label your bag as it starts to happen.

Thursday: science

Go to BBC bitesize. If you are on a computer search Week 3 episode 2 Weather around the World. You can watch the whole episode or just focus on 12.50. It shows why our seasons in the northern hemisphere are at different times to seasons in the southern hemisphere. Can you act it out with an adult or sibling? One person can be the sun and you can use a ball or balloon as Earth. Act out one day (we turn once on our axis). Then act out a whole year (we orbit the sun). Then tilt your Earth to show when you are closer to the sun (our summer) and farther away from the sun (our winter). Make a diagram or photograph and label yourself acting out a year. Send your work in. I would really love to see it.
